- Best wishes to St. Nicholas for the parish's 25th anniversary celebration on Jan. 8.

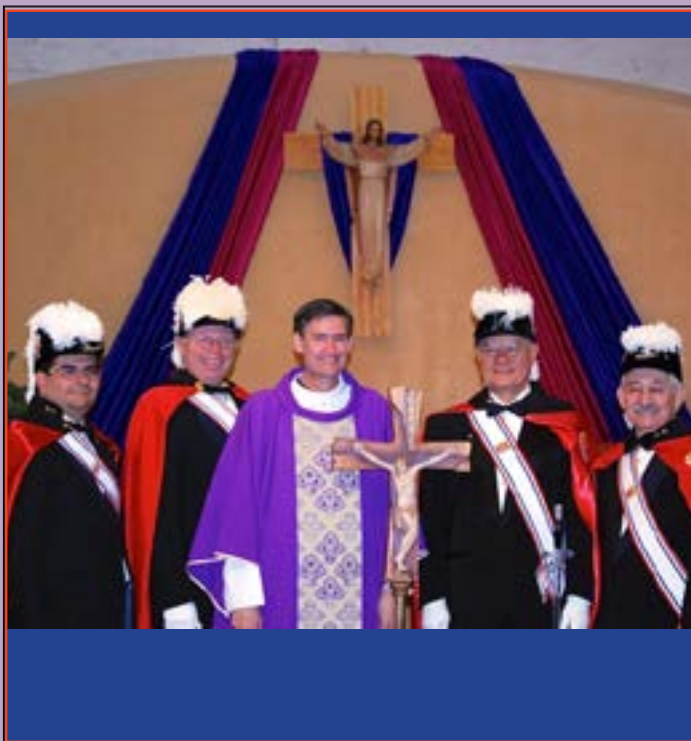
- Council of the Rock held its annual Christmas candy sale to support scholarships for children.

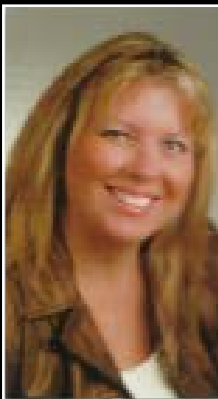
