The weekend went fast. This is a silent retreat also. No talking allowed until after the closing session.

It has since earned almost half a million dollars. The money raised goes to the Food Outreach Program, Isaiah House, Mary's Shelter, Laura's House, our parish church, and the many charity works and events of the Council 9487.

Parishioners are the big contributors as they bring recyclable items on the big second Saturday of the month, parish-wide recycling. There is also a drop off area open any day of the week.

Students that need community service hours come to help and earn service hours. More recyclable items are collected by retired Knights and parishioners as they make rounds on Monday mornings from designated locations.
