FAMILY OF THE MONTH - TERESA & DAVE STOKES

This month's Family of the Month is a family very familiar to many parishioners of Santiago De Compostela: Dave and Teresa Stokes.

Parishioners since the inception our parish, Dave and Teresa have been active in many ministries. Dave has been a 3rd degree Knight since 1984 and is a Charter member of the 4th degree Assembly 2305. Dave has been a Eucharistic Minister, worked with Teresa, in preparing couples for marriage through the Engaged Couples Ministry, worked for over 10 years in prison ministry at terminal Island, Karios and used his carpentry skills to build altar chairs, the wedding bench and several other pieces on our parish grounds.

Teresa has been in the choir, served as an Eucharistic Minister to the homebound, and along with Dave worked with NAMI (National Association Mental IIIness). Their work in NAMI for the past 20 years has given them the opportunity to conduct seminars,

facilitate classes and work with families who have family members with mental health issues. In 2002 one of their 3 sons was involved in a serious car accident and suffered a psychotic break. It was because of this event Dave and Teresa found out about NAMI, attended classes and became involved with helping other families who have members suffering with a mental illness. They are Mental Wellness ministers at SDC.

There are other ministries at SDC that the Stokes have been involved in including the Camino last month, but it is their work on the SDC Welcome Retreat Ministry that we felt needs to be recognized. The Welcome Retreat ministry is divided into the Women's Welcome Retreat Ministry and the Men's Welcome Retreat Ministry. The leaders of these ministries spend 6 months building a team with weekly meetings. They follow the retreat program that began in the 1970's as Christ Renews His Parish and has evolved into Welcome, there is more to life, program organized by Dynamic Catholic.

Dave is fond of quoting Proverbs 27:17 As Iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another. Dave explains, "the Welcome Retreat IS the earnest of the depth of what fellowship means, and when we work according to God's plan the amazing things that happen in fellowship."

Teresa said her Catholic Faith and Italian heritage have blessed her with a strong sense of family and community. Teresa said, "We are touched so deeply to be part of something so powerful as Welcome. We are filled with the joy of God's generosity. You get to know other parishioners and establish a deep, lifelong connection with them. You realize we are all broken people yet through Welcome we build each other up with the help of The Holy Spirit." She explained that watching the transformation of the attendees over the course of the weekend makes one very aware of the presence of God.

"The retreat allows everyone to build up their fellow parishioners, which makes our parish family stronger, which in turn is the goal of The Welcome Retreat. IT IS AMAZING"

Dave and Teresa thank you for all that you continue to do for our parish. Your work with the Welcome Retreat has made our parish better and stronger.

In the Absence of Fathers: A Story of Elephants and Men

Are committed fathers an endangered species in our culture? Fr. Gordon MacRae draws a troubling corollary between absent fathers and burgeoning prisons.

Wade Horn, Ph.D., President of the National Fatherhood Initiative, had an intriguing article entitled "Of Elephants and Men" in a recent issue of Fatherhood Today magazine. I found Dr. Horn's story about young elephants to be simply fascinating, and you will too. It was sent to me by a reader who wanted to know if there is any connection between the absence of fathers and the shocking growth of the American prison population.

Some years ago, officials at the Kruger National Park and game reserve in South Africa were faced with a growing elephant problem. The population of African elephants, once endangered, had grown larger than the park could sustain. So measures had to be taken to thin the ranks. A plan was devised to relocate some of the elephants to other African game reserves. Being enormous creatures, elephants are not easily transported. So a special harness was created to air-lift the elephants and fly them out of the park using helicopters.

The helicopters were up to the task, but, as it turned out, the harness wasn't. It could handle the juvenile and adult female elephants, but not the huge African bull elephants. A quick solution had to be found, so a decision was made to leave the much larger bulls at Kruger and relocate only some of the female elephants and juvenile males.

The problem was solved. The herd was thinned out, and all was well at Kruger National Park. Sometime later, however, a strange problem surfaced at South Africa's other game reserve, Pilanesburg National Park, the younger elephants' new home.

Rangers at Pilanesburg began finding the dead bodies of endangered white rhinoceros. At first, poachers were suspected, but the huge rhinos had not died of gunshot wounds, and their precious horns were left intact. The rhinos appeared to be killed violently, with deep puncture wounds. Not much in the wild can kill a rhino, so rangers set up hidden cameras throughout the park.

The result was shocking. The culprits turned out to be marauding bands of aggressive juvenile male elephants, the very elephants relocated from Kruger National Park a few years earlier. The young males were caught on camera chasing down the rhinos, knocking them over, and stomping and goring them to death with their tusks. The juvenile elephants were terrorizing other animals in the park as well. Such behavior was very rare among elephants. Something had gone terribly wrong.

Some of the park rangers settled on a theory. What had been missing from the relocated herd was the presence of the large dominant bulls that remained at Kruger. In natural circumstances, the adult bulls provide modeling behaviors for younger elephants, keeping them in line.

Juvenile male elephants, Dr. Horn pointed out, experience "musth," a state of frenzy triggered by mating season and increases in testosterone. Normally, dominant bulls manage and contain the testosterone-induced frenzy in the younger males. Left without elephant modeling, the rangers theorized, the younger elephants were missing the civilizing influence of their elders as nature and pachyderm protocol intended.

To test the theory, the rangers constructed a bigger and stronger harness, then flew in some of the older bulls left behind at Kruger. Within weeks, the bizarre and violent behavior of the juvenile elephants stopped completely. The older bulls let them know that their behaviors were not elephant-like at all. In a short time, the younger elephants were following the older and more dominant bulls around while learning how to be elephants.

Marauding in Central Park

In his terrific article, "Of Elephants and Men," Dr. Wade Horn went on to write of a story very similar to that of the elephants, though it happened not in Africa, but in New York's Central Park. The story involved young men, not young elephants, but the details were eerily close. Groups of young men were caught on camera sexually harassing and robbing women and victimizing others in the park. Their herd mentality created a sort of frenzy that was both brazen and contagious. In broad daylight, they seemed to compete with each other, even laughing and mugging for the cameras as they assaulted and robbed passersby. It was not, in any sense of the term, the behavior of civilized men.

Appalled by these assaults, citizens demanded a stronger and more aggressive police presence. Dr. Horn asked a more probing question. "Where have all the fathers gone?" Simply increasing the presence of police everywhere a crime is possible might assuage some political pressure, but it does little to identify and solve the real social problem behind the brazen Central Park assaults. It was the very same problem that victimized rhinos in that park in Africa. The majority of the young men hanging around committing those crimes in Central Park grew up in homes without fathers present.

That is not an excuse. It is a social problem that has a direct correlation with their criminal behavior. They were not acting like men because their only experience of modeling the behaviors of men had been taught by their peers and not by their fathers. Those who did have fathers had absent fathers, clearly preoccupied with something other than being role models for their sons. Wherever those fathers were, they were not in Central Park.

Dr. Horn pointed out that simply replacing fathers with more police isn't a solution. No matter how many police are hired and trained, they will quickly be outnumbered if they assume the task of both investigating crime and preventing crime. They will quickly be outnumbered because presently in our culture, two out of every five young men are raised in fatherless homes, and that disparity is growing faster as traditional family systems break down throughout the Western world.

Real men protect the vulnerable. They do not assault them. Growing up having learned that most basic tenet of manhood is the job of fathers, not the police. Dr. Horn cited a quote from a young Daniel Patrick Moynihan written some forty years ago:

"From the wild Irish slums of the 19th Century Eastern Seaboard to the riot-torn suburbs of Los Angeles, there is one unmistakable lesson in American history: A community that allows a large number of young men to grow up in broken homes, dominated by women, never acquiring any stable relationship to male authority, never acquiring any rational expectations for the future — that community asks for and gets chaos."

- Incoming WGK Teeter thanks outgoing WGK Mike Sofka for his service and leadership over the past year

- New format to meetings Supreme Council sent out new guidelines. WGK Teeter intends meetings to last from 45 minutes to 1 hour. Declaration well received by Brothers in attendance.

 - Receipts from June 7 to July 5 \$3180. Monthly payments \$6665
 - Recycling was main source of revenue. ~\$1800, Living Faith book sales of \$425.
 - Largest payout last month was for Catholic Scholarships. \$3600.
 - Checking account balance \$11719
 - Value of Vanguard Fund has fallen due to overall, global equity markets drop.
- Brother Ricardo reports no new member applications at this time. There will be a membership drive on July 24th in the Pavilion. Knights will be running a table.
- Report of Committees.
 - Recycling going well. Can always use more help. Walkers and trucks.
- Attendance for the upcoming Men's Retreat was reported at 25 and late sign-ups were offered. Thanks given to Brother Ricardo for helping to recruit for the retreat.
- Food Drive KofC will be taking over the Food Drive day-of set-up and sorting. Brief discussion on how much time it would take 5-10 brothers to sort the donations. Starting at about 8:00am and finishing by 9:00am is a realistic estimate. Only about 6-12 drop-offs usually occur so most of the effort can go into sorting.
- Upcoming preparation for the Camino. 7/16 at 6:00am, Camino-support qualification walk to be held. Waling starts at 6:30am, probably from the Church to the Lake Forest Sports Park and back. Afterwards, Food Drive volunteering to be held.
- Brother Vince reports on what's occurring in Chapter. Asks for volunteer Marshals to help set-up for meetings which are in Orange.
 - Reports on Orange County Catholic Charities cancelling Camp Recreation. However Orange Chapter Charities is being reformed into Orange Chapter. The money donated can be funneled to various organizations with this reorganization. Example is donations to Therapeutic Writing Center. Chapter has donated about \$14000 to the Special Olympics. If there is an organization that's a non-profit, we can bring it up to the chapter and arrange potential donations.
- Camino help and Registration. Camino will be on July 23. Registration is \$20. Volunteers still have to register. Currently there are 7 or 8 volunteers. Responsibilities include setting up all the Camino stations along both Camino routes and tearing the stations down once all participants have completed it.

- 4am start to set-up the morning of the Camino.
- Camino shirts are coming out. 750 shirts.
- Golf Dinner will be Friday August 18 at 5:30pm at the Church Pavilion.
 - Some prizes have already been acquired, but if anyone has spare gift cards or brand-new, unused Golf clubs etc., bring them in to Br. Dave Adkins to donate.
 - Not as many Dinner RSVP's have been received as expected so far. Requests have been sent out to about 100 knights who have supported the Dinner over the last seven years. \$120 cost for the dinner.
- About the Golf Tournament itself, looking for sponsors to contribute \$150. Tournament will be at San Juan Hills.
- Hospitality: Brother Benny announces that there will be a 6am pre-camino Mass on July 23. No 8am mass. Special mass at 11:30am however. He thanks Dave for the help over the years.
- Brother Ricardo states that he would like to recruit more members for the Fourth Degree at the end of the year. It is a long application, so send it to Ricardo early.
 - Question asked on the benefits of Fourth Degree membership:
 - KofC Honor Guard at your funeral service, engraved crucifix, color guard participation, introduce the Bishop at certain events etc.
- No Insurance Agent present.
- New District Deputy Dan Hoffman introduces himself and thanks his predecessor Michael Klett
 - Acknowledges learning curve but the coaching has been helpful. Also states that Brother Vince has a lot of good information from Chapter.
 - Highlights some efforts, including an event for people with Down Syndrome at Soka University. Chapter is still focused on finding ways to assist Intellectually Disabled.
- Finance Chair Brother John announces new gifts.
- Meeting attendees informed that memberships cards are available.
- Budget vote postponed. Revised budget to be drafted and circulated with the Council for a 30 day review and voted on--likely in September meeting.
